Peter and his friend, Gordon Waller, were better known as "Peter and Gordon." You probably know their music, and when you hear it played, experience a warm sense of nostalgia. In the mid-sixties they had a string of hit songs, including "Lady Godiva," "A World Without Love" and "Woman." In addition, he was the ultimate insider and eyewitness to the birth of the Beatles, Rolling Stones and countless other groups and performers of that incredible musical era.

Being a talented music leg-

end would not be enough. Peter also discovered, managed and produced other musical legends, including James Taylor, Linda Ronstadt and many more. He remains a very active, in demand performer. Peter maintains a busy calendar of live shows and performances around the world as well as a steady gig as host of the "From Me To You" show on the SiriusXM Beatles Channel.

Management for two of the colleges. She would learn a lot about managing grounds, buildings, general maintenance, construction projects and utilities, including water resources. Eventually accepting the position of Director of the Facilities for the School of Engineering, she spent a total of 13 years at CWRU. A move to another position that opened at the Jesuit institution, John Carroll University, would have her expanding her scope as the Associate VP of Facilities. She would also become the inaugural director of sustainability at JCU and develop a program designed to fulfill green initiatives, save money and show respect for the effects the program had on the environment.

After 37 years in Ohio, Mathew had married, moved to Southern California and blessed John and Carol with two grandchildren. Julia had moved to Baton Rouge, LA to pursue graduate studies at Louisiana State University. The effects of the pandemic on their lives with an inability to spend quality time with their family had them thinking of relocating out of Ohio. California seemed attractive, Mathew said, "Look in Ventura County, I know you are not interested in living in L.A." In May of 2021 they came out on an exploratory trip. Carol had called her friend Donna Byrnes to see where they might focus on. Donna did not skip a beat and suggested Leisure Village; her parents had lived here.

Resident Spurs Installation of **New Turn Signal**

Marci Lapair witnessed a fatal accident at the left turn into LV's main gate from Santa Rosa Road and began communicating with Camarillo City Councilman Tony Trembley. The left turn signal allowing a left turn on a solid green was clearly dangerous. Marci brought the issue to Trembley's attention. "I was always uneasy making a left turn at this intersection because the visibility is bad due to the curve in the road", said Marci. Below is an email of the response from Tony Trembley.

"Hi Marci--Good news! Our committee (Shawn M. and myself) met this morning and we approved the staff recommendation to a protected only turn [i.e. there will only be a green arrow or red arrow]. Since this is an operational change, the committee made the decision and it does not need to go to the full City Council for approval.

My understanding is that this signal change will take a few months. Both software (a program/control monitor installation) and hardware (change from a We will forever call the new turn signal "Marci's Light." We commend her for taking the issue to Council member Tremblev and following through. We are safer for her caring involvement.



5-canister signal light to a 4-canister signal) work needs to occur. I'm not sure I have the correct nomenclature, but the bottom line is that the changes should happen relatively soon.

Thanks again for bringing up this item and sending on the information from your daughter. I think this is an excellent safety change.

New Street Lighting for Safety/Savings

LV Association General Manager Bob Schaeffer has been working with Southern California Edison on a project to update the street lighting in Leisure Village. This improvement will mean the addition of better quality lighting increasing the visibility and safety of residents when traveling on our streets or walking around the Village during the dark hours.

The replacement of 403 lights will see a savings of \$6000 per year on the Village infrastructure electric bill. Return on investment will be approximately 25 years. Sasco Construction, a sub-contractor of SCE performed the replacement in a 10-day project during August.





A WORD ON WI

September – The Harvest is On!

September is the most exciting month of the year for every winery. It's when the harvest is in full swing with the hard work of making wine.


Since the first warm days last spring, wine makers waited for signs of buds beginning to show on the pruned vines. Then they waited for the buds to pop open revealing a small leafy cluster. Soon the vines are covered with soft green leaves and the canes are spreading along trellising. In another month, the vines grow tiny clusters of flowers, to be pollinated so each can become a tiny grape. Leaves shading the clusters are hand trimmed to allow more sunlight in. In the clusters, each grape is green, regardless of final color. The clusters thicken and plump up over the next two months.

And now it's July. The winemakers wait and wait...and wait for the magic moment of veraison, when the grapes stop growing bigger and start producing more sugar. Literally meaning "turn color" in French, veraison is when the green clusters of grapes start to change color, one grape at a time. This is the moment when the grapes stop growing and start to ripen.

Dark-skinned grapes like Syrah and Zinfandel start out green. At veraison, the clusters begin to show grapes of crimson and purple intermixed with green and many shades in between. Veraison continues over several weeks until the Kodachrome moment is complete, and all the clusters are dark red. For white wine grapes, the color change is more subtle, the grapes changing from bright green to more yellowish and becoming more translucent.

The winemakers are still waiting. Now it's August, time to empty every vessel and vat in the winery to make ready for the harvest. Daily samples are coming in from the



vineyards, little beakers of cloudy juice from the ripest blocks. The winemakers test the sugar levels, taste the samples and wait.

One day in August, one block of grapes is ready to pick. This year at Tablas Creek Winery in Paso Robles, the first pick was Viognier on August 18. From then until the



Word on Wine

last picking in early October, it's non-stop hard work. Grapes are handpicked, then brought into the crush pad for processing.

The crush literally gets a grape's juices flowing and is the first step in the process that turns fresh, delicate fruit into delicious, shelf-stable wine. As grape skins are broken, their sweet juices come into contact with grape skins, absorbing the flavor, colors, and tannins crucial for fine wines. Meanwhile, juices are also exposed to yeasts, either in the air or added by winemakers, that induce fermentation.

Crushing simply breaks grape berries, allowing the juice, pulp and seeds to mingle with the skins and stems of the grapes. Pressing is the process that separates the grape juice from the fiber and other solids that make up a berry. Sometimes, crushing and pressing are done at the same time, though they can be separated by a few hours or days

depending on the style of wine being made.

Meanwhile, in the vineyard, grapes continue to ripen and are gradually harvested. A parade of bins overflowing with harvested grapes are arriving for processing. Figuring out where to put the next batch becomes a huge shell game, as specific grape varietals are processed in separate lots. Empty tanks become a scarce commodity. Everyone pitches in to get the job done. The hours are long, and the work can be back-breaking. But, for everyone in the winery, harvest is absolutely the very best time of year.

Harvest is also a great time to visit a winery. It's a live-action movie with real life actors. The rest of the year, most of the winery machinery stands idle... but at harvest, everything is humming. It seems a bit chaotic. Wine-making is a chemical process, but it's during harvest you can see how physically demanding that process is. And, certainly, seeing and experiencing harvest increases the appreciation of that glass of delicious wine you've poured.



HISTORIC REFLECTION

Our Water Story

■ The history of fresh (potable) water supply in Ventura County

In the early days, before farming caused the water table to drop, the Oxnard plain was much wetter than it is now. This is why El Camino Real was routed along the northern edge of the plain. The average annual rainfall here is only 15 inches, so it was dry land farming - grains, lima beans and sugar beets - until the Santa Clara Water Conservation District was formed in 1927. After the water district was formed, farmers were allowed to cultivate citrus, walnuts, tomatoes, peppers, artichokes, celery and berries. But, irrigation was expensive and controversial.

Ralph Cawelti, the son of a local rancher, went to the UC College of Agriculture at Davis and came back with new ideas about irrigating the fields. But his father said "We don't need it; we get rain!" They parted company and he started a farm of his own.


The State had divided Ventura County into four flood zones that made county-wide cooperation difficult. The Ventura River and the Santa Clara River watersheds in the northern portion of the county were prosperous with oil and water development, but Calleguas Creek and other watersheds in the south were still dry. Faced with recurring droughts, an expanding population and economy that would soon exhaust local drinking water supplies, local leaders began looking for a reliable supplemental source. A grassroots effort, the Calleguas Creek Watershed Committee, be-



gan meeting in 1951 to talk about the problem. The main question was whether to develop water resources within the county or to import water. They recommended establishing a Municipal Water District to seek and secure a reliable supply. This was approved by voters in 1953 and the Calleguas Municipal Water District was formed. The District covers 366 square mile and serves 75 percent of Ventura County's population.

Localized concerns were part

of a broad interest in water supply in Southern California at the time. A Federal study in 1951 had assessed the feasibility of moving large amounts of water in the West. The State Engineer proposed the Feather River Project and the California Department of Water Resources was created in 1956. Colorado River water was available from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) and high quality water was promised from the new State Water Project. Local voters approved a ballot measure in 1960 to float a \$20 million bond and secure the water by having Calleguas join the MWD, a state water contractor.

A 25 mile pipeline was built to connect to the MWD system in Glendale and the mile long Santa Susana Tunnel was dug at a cost of \$22 million. To distribute the water, Calleguas built over 150 miles of pipeline and a network of pump stations, tanks and reservoirs.

Lake Bard, a surface water reservoir that is the hub of the distribution system, was built near Olsen Road to store water for peak summer and emergency use and delivery of water began in 1963.

The Oroville Dam in Northern California was built in 1961 and work soon began on the California Aqueduct, a system of canals, reservoirs and pumping plants to convey water over 400 miles from the Western slopes of the Sierras. This high quality water arrived in Southern California in 1973. Now our water is mostly from the Feather River, but can be supplemented with Colorado River when needed.

Calleguas distributes the water to local purveyors including the Pleasant Valley Mutual Water Company, Crestview Mutual Water Company and Camrosa Water District. They then sell it to the consumers. Communities served include the cities of Oxnard, Port Hueneme, Camarillo, Thousand Oaks, Moorpark, Simi Valley, and the unincorporated areas of Oak Park, Santa Rosa Valley, Bell Can-

yon, Lake Sherwood, Somis, Camarillo Estates, Camarillo Heights and Naval Base Ventura County. 95% of the water is used for municipal and domestic purposes; it is too expensive for irrigation. Many golf courses depend on pumping their own water from the aquifer.

A modern filtration plant was built in 1995 to purify the water by treating it with ozone gas. Other innovations include reuse of treated wastewater from Thousand Oaks for irrigation, such as the landscaping and golf course at Leisure Village, and banking MWD water in the Fox Canyon Aquifer. Desalination is another way to make good water, since increasing salt levels in Calleguas Creek and the groundwater make it unsuitable for use. A 17-mile pipeline takes the brine concentrate from the new desalination plant to the ocean. Our water supplies were secured through the foresight and effort of our community leaders. Wisdom in the way we conserve the water in these years of drought will pay honor to the legacy of our water-seeking forebears.



PREPARE TO PROTECT!

September is national preparedness month.

In a disaster, local officials and first responders cannot reach everyone immediately. You and members of your community need to be prepared ahead of time. Be prepared at all times to both shelter in place and bug out fast! Be prepared, not scared.

10 ESSENTIAL PREPAREDNESS ITEMS

WATER: 3-7 day supply, one gallon per person and per pet per day. Think about needs for drinking, hygiene and cleaning. Also, consider a water purification kit.

FOOD: Have a minimum 2 week supply of non-perishable food per person. Focus on foods that do not require refrigeration, preparation, or cooking as much as possible. And remember a manual can opener!

FLASHLIGHTS: Have a variety (hand-held, battery, solar, hand crank, lantern-style and/or head lamp for hands-free usage)

MEDICATIONS: Collect 1 month's worth of any prescription medicines. Include non-prescription fever/pain reliever, anti-diarrheal items, vitamins, etc. in your stockpile.

FIRST AID: First aid kit & a first aid manual for reference under stress.

PERSONAL CARE ITEMS: Personal hygiene items, TP, paper towels, trash bags.

RADIO & BATTERIES: Have a battery powered radio and extra batteries. Consider a crank-operated or solar-powered radio. Solar battery packs are a good option as well.

CLOTHES: Sturdy shoes, extra clothes, blankets, rain gear and outerwear.

IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS: Have copies of important personal ID, deeds, mortgage papers, insurance policies, medical cards, etc. Keep electronic copies of important information on a keychain drive you can grab and go.

TOOLS: Keep a basic tool kit for on-the-go. Think wrench, screwdriver, hammer, knife, scissors, sturdy gloves, fire extinguisher, whistle, manual can opener, etc.

INCREASE YOUR READINESS WEEKLY DURING SEPTEMBER

Week 1: Make a Plan. Plan ahead and talk about how you, your family and friends will respond and communicate during and after a disaster.

Week 2: Build Kits.Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home. Don't forget to consider the unique needs each person or pet may have in case you have to evacuate quickly. Have kits at home, in your car and at your workplace. Update your kits and supplies regularly.

Week 3: Prepare for Disasters. Limit the impacts that disasters have on you and your family. Know the risk of disasters in your area. Learn how to make your home stronger in the face of earthquakes, storms and other common hazards. Check your insurance coverage to make sure it is up-to-date.

Week 4: Teach youth about preparedness. Talk to youth in your life and prepare them for emergencies so they know how to respond. Plan what to do in case they are separated from others. Practice and role play to help them feel capable of responding in a variety of situations to reduce the chance of panic.
